



LOTS TO SEE AND DO


There really is plenty to see and do in the historic Port of Wentworth and indeed the greater Wentworth Shire and surrounds.

Visitors can enjoy natural features, such as the confluence of the Murray and Darling Rivers (from the Junction Park platform) or by venturing along the cultural and environmental walk on Junction Island to the inner tip of the confluence. Other natural features include experiencing the great River Red Gums, Perry Sand Hills or perhaps a paddle along Tuckers Creek, a short waterway which exits the Murray and joins the Darling to form what is colloquially known as 'the island'.

The region is well known for and proud of its sporting facilities boasting top class golf courses, tennis courts and bowling greens. Both the Murray and Darling Rivers are popular for all manner of river activities including water skiing, pleasure cruises, house boating or just attempting to entice a mighty Murray Cod. Wentworth also has a community funded world class skate park for those that appreciate something a little more energetic and adventurous. The rivers link the communities within this region. Wentworth Shire includes the communities of Wentworth, Dareton, Pomona, Pooncarie, Buronga and Gol Gol. However our bond with community extends beyond our Shire and incorporates historical and cultural ties with the communities of Menindee, Wilcannia, Tilpa, Louth and Bourke - all historical river ports in their own right.

To complement the vast array of natural, environmental and cultural activities there are also many unique tourist attractions to explore. The Australian Inland Botanic Gardens, walking trails, heritage buildings and river landscapes are all available to the inquisitive explorer.

With these diverse experiences a full range of accommodation is catered for; from outback farm stays, river view apartments, motels, houseboat holidays, caravan parks and B&B's.



RELAX ON THE WATER

WHERE THE RIVERS MEET

The Historic Port of Wentworth is uniquely located at the confluence of the two greatest rivers in Australia; the Murray and the Darling. A perfect place for the creation of Australia's busiest inland port in riverboat history. Wentworth helped facilitate transport and trade from South Australia through to Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland. Though paddle steamers are fewer now, the rivers are still vital lifelines for towns, giving individuals the chance to captain their own craft along the vast waterways.

THE DARLING RIVER

The Darling River is regarded as Australia's third longest river however combined with its longest continuous tributaries measures some 2844km making it Australia's longest river system. With many of its tributaries starting in south east Queensland and north eastern New South Wales the Darling River flows to the confluence where it joins the Murray River at Wentworth. Sedimentary clay produces a stark colour contrast between the two rivers which is evident as their waters merge. Travellers can explore the length of this great river by utilizing the 'Darling River Run' self-guided tour map.

THE MURRAY RIVER

Whilst the Murray was initially known by several names it was Captain Charles Sturt on the 23rd of January, 1830 who chose to name the river after Sir George Murray, Secretary of State for the Colonies in the British Government. Acting as a natural border between New South Wales and Victoria the Murray also depends on tributaries sourcing water from winter rains and snow-thaw. It flows 2530km from the high country in the east to the ocean at the Murray mouth near Goolwa in South Australia. The introduction of weirs and locks in the 1920's ensures a constant 'weir pool' in and about Wentworth, allowing water sports and recreational activities to become a major draw card. Truly, one of nature's most idyllic and surreal playgrounds.

THE PORT OF WENTWORTH

History, culture and charm - the gateway to the Darling River and outback NSW

Welcome to Wentworth, where the Darling River merges with the mighty Murray. Tributaries west of the Great Dividing Range feed these rivers with summer monsoon rain to the Darling and winter rain and snow melt to the Murray making this region 'an oasis in the desert'.

Wentworth and surrounds retains much of its rich history, boasting a natural environmental and pioneering diversity - our region offers something for everyone.

In the late 1880's Wentworth was Australia's busiest inland port and was a vital link to remote inland ports along the length of the Darling River. Ports at Wentworth, Pooncarie, Menindee, Wilcannia and Bourke were vital trading locations for remote pastoralists and inland inhabitants. The Darling River is no longer the watery highway for riverboats, trade and produce, however the colonial charm of life on the Darling will be felt when visiting the PS Ruby, a restored and fully functional paddle steamer. Contemporary river traffic has replaced the relics of the past yet the natural beauty, environmental and colonial charm can still be experienced from houseboats and leisure craft.

With a Weir and Lock 10 situated at Wentworth visitors can be assured of water levels to support houseboating, camping, fishing and waterskiing holidays all year round.





THE GREATER MURRAY JUNCTION RESERVE

The Greater Murray Darling Junction Reserve is the starting point for the Junction Island Trail, a 2km return walk to the inner confluence of the Murray and Darling Rivers. The entrance to the Junction Island Trail is significant due to the location of a magnificent example of an indigenous 'canoe tree'. The walking trail meanders through an ecologically significant wildlife refuge of natural bushland which hosts many varieties of vegetation, flora and fauna. Keen observers can often spot small reptiles, a range of birds and even a Murray Carpet Snake if you're lucky.

Discovered by Captain Charles Sturt in January of 1830, the confluence of the Murray and Darling Rivers represents the heart of the Murray Darling Basin. The confluence is the point where the waters of the upper Murray and the Darling come together. Distinct differences in water colour between the two rivers can often be observed at the confluence. Water from the Murray (snow fields) have travelled 1688km and the waters of the Darling some 2740km at this point, from the confluence the waters travel a further 832km to the Southern Ocean.

In more recent years the Darling River has become known as the 'Baaka' in recognition of the 'Barkindji' peoples, their culture and their connection with the land and waters of the region.

Also of heritage significance and adjacent to the Greater Murray Darling Junction Reserve is the 'Old Wentworth Water Tower'. Built by the Hudson Bros of Clyde and shipped to Australia this water tower provided water to the Wentworth township from 1888. It is a prominent feature within our skyline and is unique in its construction due to the nine cylindrical columns bolted in four sections supporting a water tower tank with galvanized iron polygonal roof and decorative wrought iron finial.



NOTABLE TREES Wentworth Shire

We've all heard the saying 'couldn't see the wood for the trees', well this may well apply to Wentworth Shire and surrounds as we are blessed with many and varied species of trees. For those of us that are interested in flora, fauna and the environment, our region offers magnificent examples of many species of trees and several walking trails that will inspire every field naturalist or casual walker of nature trails.

River Red Gums are prevalent and majestic, they are abundant around our various water courses and billabongs. Many trees bear the scars of indigenous culture having been selected in 'Canoe' making or the creation of 'Boundary Trees'. The Caravan Park at Wentworth has several River Red Gums but one, Sturt's Tree, stands out as having historical significance as it marks the location of Captain Charles Sturt weighing anchor in late January 1830 having just discovered the Junction of the Murray and Darling Rivers. Of particular note within the grounds of the Australian Inland Botanic Gardens (AIBG) is a Mallee Tree affectionately known as the 'WOW Tree' (Eucalyptus oleosa). This particular tree is unique as it is estimated at over 2500 years old, there are no other examples, of this age, in existence within the region. The Mallee Tree is also meaningful in Aboriginal culture with trunks used for 'Didgeridoo' making. The conductive roots could also be used as a water source.

Jacaranda trees (natives of South America) are prevalent within the region having been planted as avenues in many areas, they are easily identified during spring by their displays of vibrant 'lilac' blossom. Wonderful examples of the Bunya Pine can be found within Fotherby Park in Wentworth and the AIBG. A large evergreen coniferous, it can grow to heights of 50m. This tree produces both 'male' and 'female' cones around Oct-Nov each year, the female cones can measure up to 30cm wide and weigh around 10kg.

Also of significance at the corner of Adams and Adelaide Sts is the 'Inkberry Tree' believed to be one of several to have been planted in the early 1900's by a traveller from South Australia as he moved along the Murray River. The 'Inkberry Tree' (Pircunia or Phytolacca Dioica) is a native of Uruguay and Argentina, it is also referred to as the 'Ombu Tree'.

Located within the sand dunes at Perry Sandhills is a magnificent Murray River Red Gum (Eucalyptus camaldulensis) known as the 'God tree', which is estimated to be over 500 years old. Over time, the sand has completely engulfed the trunk of the tree, so that you are actually standing in the canopy. The story is told that on the 31st December 1999, the eve of the change of to the new millennium, the God tree was quite unsightly in that it had been vandalised and was covered in graffiti. The next day, 1st January 2000, those who travelled out to see the tree witnessed a pristine tree, the God tree had shed her bark overnight at the start of the new century.

Our flood plains encourage admirable stands of Black and Grey Box whilst Mallee Trees, Acacias and Belah thrive on the lighter sandier country. There are also examples of Moreton Bay & Port Jackson Fig trees in Sandwych Street Wentworth and many examples of European varieties throughout the region.



DARETON

Named after Water Conservation & Irrigation Commissioner Henry Dare, the centre of the Coomealla Irrigation District.

The town of Dareton is at the centre of the Coomealla Irrigation Area, an ambitious and successful horticultural development which begun in 1922. The bush landscape was transformed into a patchwork of orderly patterned vineyards and orchards by soldier settlers following the two world wars.



At the heart of Dareton is the Coomealla Memorial Sporting Club which provides fine dining and live entertainment. Adjacent to the 'Coomie Club' are excellent bowling greens, a caravan park and a full 18 hole greens golf course on the banks of the Murray River.

A visit to BMeet the meeting place of local indigenous artists will provide a fascinating insight to the very talented local artists.

Wentworth has a great volunteering community and the perfect example of this is the Dareton's Men in the Shed space. The newly completed 1.5 million dollar complex in Pool Road, is the largest Men's Shed in the southern hemisphere and welcomes locals and visitors alike, Wednesday and Saturday 9am-noon.

The area is an angler's paradise and a natural habitat for flora and fauna. The Dareton/Coomealla bushland is also home to the Coomealla Mildura Mountainless Bike Club.







This is a memorable drive amongst impressive scenery, incorporating thousands of years of indigenous history, pastoral heritage and memories of Australia's pioneering days. The abundance of flora, fauna, ancient rock art and historical landmarks characteristic to this region, provides much to see and do along the way. Be sure to stop and visit the iconic outback townships and enjoy their local hospitality. Discover their heritage trails, museums, visitor attractions and living history along the way.

The Darling River Run is an adventure waiting for you to discover.







MENINDEE

Visited by explorers Major Thomas Mitchell and Charles Sturt, and later used as a base by Burke and Wills in 1860.

Menindee the first town on the Darling (Baaka) River settled in 1853 and gazetted in 1863, is sited between the Darling (Baaka) River and Lake Menindee, it currently has a population of around 550 residents. The Menindee Lakes and Darling (Baaka) River were first discovered by the Barkindji People who have continuously inhabited the area for over 40000 years.

The natural flood plain lakes system now partially modified, is seven times the size of Sydney Harbour when full, providing significant breeding and feeding grounds for thousands of water birds, fish and aquatic life. The lakes system provide the visitor with many activities including fishing, birdwatching, bushwalking and fantastic opportunities for the amateur or professional photographer with over 200 species of bird and wildlife that frequent the Menindee Lakes and Darling Baaka. Visitors have the photography opportunity of a lifetime at sunset at both Lake Menindee and Lake Pamamaroo. Menindee played an important role in early exploration of our vast continent. The original accommodation at Maiden's Hotel where our ill-fated explorers Burke and Wills stayed in 1860 is still utilised today. The site of their base camp on Lake Pamamaroo (now the Burke & Wills Camping Ground) is open to visitors. The town also played an important part in our state's pastoral, riverboat and rail history, still providing access across the Darling for the transcontinental (Indian Pacific) railway.

Bordering the town is the Kinchega National Park, home of the heritage listed Kinchega Woolshed. This is a must see, to walk through and visualise the old shearers, who shore over six million sheep during its time as a working pastoral property.

With sealed all weather access from Broken Hill in the north and from Wentworth in the south there is now no reason not to visit Menindee.



MUNGO NATIONAL PARK

Part of the world heritage listed Willandra Lakes region.

Discover this natural wonder - a unique landscape. Over thousands of years, sun, wind and rain have created this ancient landscape. Lake Mungo's 33km long ancient dry lake beds & spectacular sand formations that make the 'Walls of China', are what visitors come to see. The story of the past can be read in the land as we see it today. The plants and animals have evolved from mega flora & fauna that have gone before, and landscape changes have left evidence in the lakebeds, the lunettes, the dunes and the sediments of the life lived over 40000 years ago. More recently, humans have influenced this area, perhaps subtly in Aboriginal times, and then with more impact since white settlement and grazing of the land.

Mungo National park is located 146 km from Wentworth. The on-site Interpretative Centre has tour maps and available camp sites. Guided tour companies operate regularly from Mildura or group pick up at Wentworth.

DISCOVER OUR RICH PAST

The Wentworth Shire and Darling Outback showcases over 150 years of pioneer settlement and 40,000 years of indigenous culture.



STANDING THE TEST OF TIME

Scattered throughout the Wentworth Shire and Darling Outback are historic buildings and structures - a legacy to the pioneers and engineers of times long past. From the grandeur of large homesteads nestled along the rivers, to historic schools, churches and courthouses (in regular use since 1879). Liftspan bridges still operate to facilitate navigation of larger river vessels, long retired farm and household implements are displayed in local parks and the Pioneer Museum, all a tribute to the perseverance of our pioneers and their strong will to provide for their families. Graziers were the first to arrive - the various ports flourished. Irrigation later turned the region into an 'oasis in the desert'. What a legacy our pioneers have created.



THEGOA LAGOON AND INDIGENOUS TRAILS

The Aboriginal people the 'Barkindji' (or Paakantyi') living along the Darling River referred to it as the 'Baaka' meaning 'belonging to the river'. The Baaka was the life source for the Barkindji people providing the spiritual connection and essential food, clothing and tools for life in this sometimes harsh environment.

The Thegoa Lagoon with its proximity to the Murray Darling junction was a natural 'meeting place' where Aboriginal people gathered for Corroborees. Nothing's changed - it remains an idyllic 'meeting place'.

A self-guided tour will expose the walker to its natural beauty and the prevalence of the archaeological sites - including middens, hearths, (fireplaces) and scar trees from which canoes, shields and tools have been crafted by the Barkindji people.

The keen observer will marvel at the Boundary Tree a remarkable example of the Aboriginal ability to graft branches together to create an eye or ring in the tree. Visible from a distance this was a clever way of marking a tribal boundary. Thegoa Lagoon Reserve offers walk and drive trails and a bird hide to observe flora and fauna within minutes of Wentworth and the popular Murray Darling river junction.

Thegoa self-guided tour brochures are available at local Visitor Information Centres.





AND BEYOND

Far West NSW is possibly the states best kept secret.

New visitors to the Far West are openly amazed at what there is to see and do in this 'neck of the woods'. With the Darling Baaka River at the heart of the region the area is steeped in indigenous culture and history. The townships of Bourke, Louth, Tilpa, Wilcannia, Menindee and Pooncarie are all nestled on the Darling Baaka. All have significant river trade history and unique stories in their own right. Louth hosts a community Outback race event in August each year and is home to Shindys Inn, the Tilpa Pub (c1894) was established to service the river trade and outlying stations, Wilcannia and its iconic colonial architecture is not to be missed. A quick Google search of any of these locations will surprise the enquiring visitor.



WILCANNIA

A township older than Broken Hill.

Wilcannia, established in 1866 is in fact older than Broken Hill. In 1883 the "Wilcannia Times" reported Charles Rasp's ore discovery which led to the founding of Broken Hill Proprietary (BHP) and Broken Hill township.

Locally quarried sandstone was utilised in construction of many of the town's iconic buildings. The Post Office, Hospital, St James Anglican Church, the Bond Store, Police Station, Court House/Gaol and Resch's brewery are all examples of Wilcannia's unique architecture. The town once had a population of 1,200 people which, aided by miners heading to Mt. Browne, drovers and other visitors supported 12 hotels. Today only one 'watering hole' remains, the Club Hotel on the site of the first hotel built in 1864, the remains of Resch's Brewery is now part of the Wilcannia Golf Club.



EARLY TRANSPORTATION AND COMMUNICATION

River Steamers

The settlement of the Wentworth Shire was largely enabled by the utilisation of the Murray and Darling rivers as major arterial routes for cargo and passengers. Wentworth and the ports along the Darling River owe their early vitality to the tenacity and endurance of the river steamers and their crews.

Coaches

Horse drawn coaches were a vital communication and transport medium within the Shire and Darling Outback. Several lines operated in the region including Cobb & Co, Burton Bros, Charters Bros, Kidman Nichols, McMahon and John Hill & Co.The coach services were also carriers of the Royal Mail. During the dry months when river boats weren't viable coaches stepped up by offering extra coach services for passengers.

Bullocks, Donkey and Camel

The transport of wool clips to the nearest wharf or barge stop was often performed by the use of bullock teams, donkey teams or camel trains. Afghans were sometimes employed to guide the camels on their arduous journeys.

Postal Services


The first postal service in the region was based at Moorna Station. When it moved to Wentworth it was operated from a shed in Darling Street, with a new Post Office being built in 1899 (corner of Darling and Sandwych Sts). The mail routes were important links for the large stations with mail being delivered by horseback over large distances prior to the introduction of motor vehicles.

MUST SEE AND DO

I) The confluence of the Murray and Darling Rivers can be viewed from the observation tower at 'Junction Park'.

2) Stand on the inner point of the confluence and experience the merging of the two rivers. The different colour of the water from these two rivers makes this an intriguing experience. Information boards along the walking trail provide an enlightening insight into the environmental and cultural significance of the junction area and its unique flora and fauna.

3) The Old Wharf on the Darling River and the Captain John Egge Memorial.

A short walk from the main street to the river front, once the scene of busy river trade.

4) Fotherby Park houses a range of pioneer heritage machinery including a 'drop log' homestead, an original Chaffey Brothers steam powered tractor, and the iconic 'grey Fergie' the savior of the town in the 1956 flood event, and the statue and story of Possum 5) PS Ruby - The 'Ruby' can be viewed at her mooring in Fotherby Park, unfortunately public access is not an option at this time however further information can be sought from the Visitor Information Centre on 03 5027 5080.

6) The Wentworth Rotary Pioneer Museum and 'The Old Gaol' for a taste of Wentworth history.

7) The Wentworth Military Collection displays over 125 years of Military service from all over the world.

8) River Boat Rod's Model Paddle Steamer display. Over 30 hand crafted and detailed, to scale models of Paddle Steamers of the past. Open Wednesday to Sunday 10am to 4pm. Free entry.



OUT AND ABOUT

WENTWORTH TRAIL

Travel back in history at your own pace.Visit 34 points of interest as you are guided about Wentworth on the Wentworth trail. The tour of the historic Port of Wentworth begins at the Visitor Information Centre, 61 Darling Street. It highlights historical buildings, from the old Post Office built in 1899, to the Town Hall (1844) to the cultural sites such as mussel beds and middens.

AUSTRALIAN INLAND BOTANIC GARDENS

An oasis in the desert. Take the time to discover the jewel of Sunraysia with a visit to the beautifully landscaped botanic gardens. There's the Garnpang Homestead Gift and Coffee Shop, rose gardens and plants representing every Australian State and Territory on display. A 'Big Breakfast and Market' is held on the 4th Saturday of every month at the Homestead.

PERRY SAND HILLS

A natural wonder of Wentworth. Explore the drifting sands of this ice age formation, home to mega fauna fossils and a World War Two RAAF practice range. Enjoy a quiet stroll over the hills or go wild with the endless fun to be had up and down the dunes.

VISITOR INFORMATION CENTRE GALLERY

The Wentworth Shire Visitor Information Centre at 61 Darling Street Wentworth provides the perfect introduction to the region's rich environmental, cultural and historical past. With much of the open floor plan dedicated to static explanations, interpretive displays and interactive activities, the visitor can embrace the local history, our challenges and our achievements. Also available is the Wentworth library with an adjacent outdoor area and gazebo looking over the Darling Baaka, a great place to relax, ponder your next activity, read or enjoy a coffee from the Junction Café.

PS RUBY - THE AUTHENTIC 1907 HERITAGE PADDLESTEAMER

Built in Morgan, S.A. in 1907, as a 'side wheeler' the PS Ruby (or the Paddle Steamer Ruby) is currently the flagship of the historic Port of Wentworth. 'Side wheelers' were designed and built for their manoeuvrability and were ideally suited to the unpredictable and sometimes treacherous Murray River. Whilst the PS Ruby had an industrious life as a cargo and passenger vessel operating between Echuca, Mildura, Wentworth and Goolwa she now rests in a pondage within the confines of Fotherby Park Wentworth. Recognising the historic value of this iconic vessel the Rotary Club of Wentworth purchased the neglected PS Ruby in 1968, and successfully completed an extensive restoration process which enabled the Ruby to be presented to the public as an authentic and operating paddle steamer of its era. Having completed the restoration Rotary handed ownership to the Wentworth Community in the trusteeship of the Wentworth Shire Council.
